



In Memoriam: John Michael Boardman, PhD

Saturday, March 20, 2021 e-mail from Jim Voeglein, President of BCC:

It is with great sadness that I inform you that Michael Boardman, long term member of the Baltimore Camera Club passed away on Thursday March 18th. He was our Treasurer for many, many years and was granted a Lifetime Membership. Though Michael had not been an active member for several years he will be sorely missed.

Michael would always be present on our Club trips and photo shoots. He was a fixture in this camera club. A Bafford Button recipient for his contribution to this club for so many years.

Please join me is wishing Michael to rest in peace and that he will not be forgotten. Our condolences go out to his family.

I'm grateful that since 2006, when I joined BCC, until a few years ago when Michael moved away to be closer to family, I got the chance to volunteer with him, and became familiar with his quiet, respectful personality, and surprisingly deadpan humor. We coserved on the BCC Board for three years—he was treasurer and I was secretary.

From his Hopkins obituary (hub.jhu.edu/2021/03/19/michael-boardman-obituary/): Born in Manchester, England, Boardman served in the Royal Air Force in 1956 before earning a bachelor's degree and PhD from Trinity College Cambridge of the University of Cambridge.

Doing more Google research, I realized that I didn't know that Michael was famous (his own Wikipedia

web page https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Michael_Boardman). He was a "mathematician whose specialty was algebraic and differential topology. He was formerly at the University of Cambridge, England, and then a full professor at Johns Hopkins University. He is most widely known for his construction of the first rigorously correct model of the homotopy category of spectra." In 1998, there was an entire conference hosted by the American Mathematical Society in honor of him (http://www.ams.org/books/conm/239/). It seems that this math is used to solve many algebraic conundrums, and helpful for differential geometry of surfaces, n-dimensional manifolds, and knot theory (to name a few).

It is interesting to note that Edward Bafford, the namesake on our annual award, was instrumental in starting the Council on Maryland Photography Clubs (CMCC) (source: http://www.luminous-lint.com/app/photographer/Edward_L_Bafford/ABCDEF/), for which Michael also served as treasurer. CMCC/All-Maryland CC had competitions from 1948 until its hiatus before recently re-starting/morphing into the Maryland Photography Alliance (https://www.mdphotoalliance.org/).



He was definitely the strong, silent type, but when he did speak up, it showed that he was listening, and, more often than not, it was on point and funny (OK, growing up in Canada, I'm used to the various forms of British humo(u)r, ranging from dry, sarcastic to 'Monty Python'-esque)!

Maryland Photography Alliance Report **Steve Sattler**



From the very beginning MPA wanted to be an organization which could give back to the community it served.

In 2017 MPA named Flashes of Hope (FOH) as its official charity. FOH raises funds to accelerate a cure for children's cancer while honoring the unique life and memories of children fighting cancer. Founded in 2001 by the parents of a child with cancer, Flashes of Hope brightens the lives of children with cancer through a national photography program and by investing in pediatric cancer research. There are 45 FOH Chapters throughout the U.S., including Baltimore and Washington, DC.

Flashes of Hope has partnered with over 80 pediatric hospitals and dozens of summer camps for children with cancer, presenting free photo packages to over 87,052 children at hospitals and camps across the United States. I personally have photographed three years in a row at summer camps, and it was one of the 5th MPA Photography Contest most rewarding experiences in my photographic journey.

Realizing that for some families the portraits were the last ones they had of their child, Flashes of Hope began funding research to provide improved health outcomes for pediatric cancer patients. Since 2009, FOH has raised over \$10 million for research.

Through MPA's "Odyssey of Light" Series, MPA has raised over \$6,700 through 50/50 raffles. During the



2020 "Odyssey of Light" Webinar, over \$5,000 was raised through the generosity of many photographers. FOH recently merged with Alex's Lemonade Stand, who has been FOH's long-time research funding partner. FOH will be even better than ever!

But Flashes of Hope is not the only charity MPA has supported. Through MPA's "Artist Spotlight" Series of free webinars, over \$34,000 has been raised through 16 webinars for the Maryland Food Bank. This has helped provide over 102,000 meals for the too many people in need these days. In fact, one of the main reasons "Artist Spotlight" was created, was to help the community after COVID-19 hit.

MPA's success in giving back to the community must be shared by caring photographers like yourself who participate in MPA programs, and who are very generous making voluntary donations. It is rewarding to use photography to give back to the community, especially when photography has given all of us so much!

When Does a Picture Stop Being an Original Picture?

Modern post-processing precipitates adjustments in major photography competitions & changes in Photoshop **Kent Sutorius**



2019 Photographer of the Year famous for. award to Björn Persson. A few days later they disqualified him because they discovered he had corrected the ear on the charging elephant image he took. Similar disqualifications have taken place with major competitions over the last 8 years. In 2012, Harry Fisch won the Places category for National Geographic of the

Year but was disqualified for removing a plastic bag. You can read his story here. Photo manipulation is not in 2013 and 2015 plus 20% of all photos were disnew. It has been going on since the late 1800's. Even the great Ansel Adams said, "You don't take a photograph, you make it." He knew how to visualize a great here, but one example is the removing or cloning of image but he would then take his "straight image" (directly out of the camera) and spend a whole day in the darkroom to produce one print. He said, "Dodging and burning are steps to take care of mistakes God made in establishing tonal relationships." Some of his before and after photos are quite dramatic

Today, according to a number of major photography competition rules, possibly some of Ansel's works (like the above) would be disqualified from some photography competitions because too much dodging and burning was utilized in the darkroom. Rules for major competitions have become more strict in the last 5 years because of the continued advancement in photo editing software with pixel manipulation.

World Press Photo (WPP) produced probably the strictest rules after the winning photo was disqualified qualified in 2015 and 16% were disqualified in 2016.1 You can read WPP's 2020's requirements elements in an image. About the only thing you can remove is lens dust. Dodging and burning to obscure or eliminate objects in the image is not allowed.

National Geographic and Smithsonian have similar guidelines but leave a little bit more subjectivity to the judges. They do state that post processing should be minimal in dodging, burning, color correction, and cropping.

Canon allows minimal cropping and basic color correction but no pixel removal is allowed. POY (Picture of the Year) has similar guidelines (see here).

In essence, competitions that provide big money, photography excursion awards, or instant exposure and validation want the image to closely resemble what the photographer saw. And if you win, many competitions want to see your original RAW file and the images you shot before and after the image you are entering in the contest.

Spotting Pixel Manipulation, AI Technology and Adobe Photoshop

Today all images from scanned negatives to DSLR and mirrorless cameras are digitized. Each image file is a mapping (bitmap) of pixels in the image. Each pixel has a value to it and is sequenced to where it goes. Pixel manipulation occurs when these values and sequencing is changed by moving, copying, splicing or deleting pixels. Major photography competitions rules are designated to limit the amount of pixel manipulation. If a winner is going to be disqualified,

of manipulation if the original RAW file doesn't reveal it

The professional or enthusiast photographer who also does post-processing can often spot where some pixel manipulation has occurred. They can see certain artifacts such as halos, improper lighting and/or cast shadows for an area, and unusual patterns left from cloning.

But AI post-processing software has made it more difficult for the trained eye to see the manipulation. Adobe Photoshop is considered the industry standard for photographers and designers. But what may be more recognizable is Photoshop being used as a verb to refer to an altered or even faked image. Adobe dislikes the use of Photoshop as a verb and has provided guidelines (<u>link</u>) to what people should say instead of "photoshopped." Adobe is also putting money in research and Photoshop product design to let an interested party see how much pixel manipulation has been done with its product.

Vlad Morariu is a senior research scientist at Adobe (former research scientist at the University of Maryland). His initial research focused on manipulation via 2. https://blog.adobe.com/en/publish/2018/06/22/ splicing (combining one or more photos), copy-paste, and removal. Vlad said, "Using tens of thousands of examples of known, manipulated images, we successfully trained a deep learning neural network to recognize image manipulation, fusing two distinct techniques together in one network to benefit from their complementary detection capabilities."2 Those two techniques are using RGB streams which can detect changes in color and brightness and noise streams which can detect authentic versus altered areas of the image. According to the referenced article, "Now, what used to take a forensic expert hours to do can be done in seconds." More research needs to be done for such a product to get into the hands of the consumer but Adobe has provided an alternative for its Photoshop and Behance consumers.

In early 2021 updated versions of Photoshop and Behance will include the Content Authenticity Initiative (CAI) icon. It will be an opt-in feature. When the icon is pressed it provides a checklist of metadata added to your image that you want to be used to authenticate your image. In addition to the EXIF data from your camera, the CAI metadata can provide who

forensic experts have to come in and verify the degree shot the picture, when and where it was shot and all the edits that were done to the image. Individuals that use Behance can click on the image and see all the data and if it really belongs to you and if any other manipulation has taken place. It is well worth it to see Adobe's short video Adobe Content Authenticity Prototype: Attribution in Action on how it is used in both products at this link.

> Within this year major social platforms, major newspapers, journals and magazines will be utilizing Behance or other products to verify CAI images as authentic.

But there are other options for the photographer who uses post-processing to create the art they want. You can Google photography manipulation contests and find a number. One of the more popular ones is the A' Photography and Photo Manipulation Design Competition sponsored by A' Design and you can find information on it here.
